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PARTICIPANTS

Angela C. Antle was the 2025 Rachel Carson Writer in Residence at the University of Munich. Kyla Bruff is an Associate Professor of Philosophy at Carleton University and a Research Fellow at the Institute for Social Research in Frankfurt. She is also Co-Director of FANE. Kyla's work primarily concerns nature and political philosophy in the German Idealist and Critical Theory traditions, and their implications for challenges today.

Joseph Carew is a Lecturer at the Department of Philosophy, University of the Fraser Valley. He specializes in the History of Philosophy. His current research concerns conceptions of nature in Hegel, German Idealism, and Romanticism.

Melanie Coughlin is an Assistant Professor of Philosophy and Religion at Memorial University and a specialist in Japanese Philosophy and its relation to Continental Philosophy.

Helena Cutbill is a 23 year old Londoner, who recently graduated from Trinity College Dublin's School of Religion and Peace Studies with a Bachelor's of Arts. The focuses of my undergraduate career were the philosophies of the secularising West, the built environment as a theological text, and contemporary theologies of home and community. She hopes to dedicate her time and education to making practical the ideas I have found so important in the last four years with a particular emphasis on strengthening urban communities.

Etienne Dame was born and raised in Augsburg, Germany. Since 2023 he has been studying philosophy and history at the University of Augsburg and work at Uwe Voigt's Chair for Analytic Philosophy and at Gregor Webers Chair for Ancient History. He has worked on Henri Bergson's Philosophy of life, the free will debate, and Ernst Cassirer's philosophy of symbolic forms. He is a recipient of a scholarship from the Max Weber Program of Bavaria.

David A. Greenwood, PhD, is Professor and Canada Research Chair of Environmental Education at Lakehead University in Thunder Bay, Ontario, Canada. His scholarship, teaching, and activism revolve around place-based, environmental, sustainability, and holistic education. Widely published in these areas, he is also co-editor of several books and journals, including *Place-Based Education in the Global Age: Local Diversity*. His theories on critical, place-based education have influenced programs in schools, communities, and in higher education across disciplines, including social science, physical science, the humanities, and professional schools such as engineering, social work, business, law, and medicine. His public and academic activism aims to implement critical place-based learning by facilitating acts of decolonization and re-inhabitation with diverse communities. His latest project involves using the labyrinth as a creative form of experiential learning that inspires deep reflection and foster connectedness to self, others, and land. David lives in the forest north of Lake Superior with his partner Jill and their children Eli, Kate, and Ivy.

PARTICIPANTS

Sean McGrath is a Professor of Philosophy and Co-Director of FANE. He is the author of several works in environmental ethics, including *Thinking Nature: An Essay in Political Eschatology* (Edinburgh University Press, 2018) and *Political Eschatology* (Wipf & Stock, 2023).

Matthew Nini is a Researcher at the Institute of Philosophy in Zagreb. He works on German Idealism and religion. Recent publications include, *Fichte in Berlin: The 1804 Wissenschaftslehre* (McGill-Queens, 2024) and *The Book of Nocturnes: Philosophical Fragments* (Spring Publications, 2025).

Joachim Rathmann is a climatologist who teaches Geography at the University of Augsburg. He is currently completing a second dissertation, on Philosophy, with a focus on environmental virtue ethics.

Michelle Rebidoux is a native of southern Ontario. She studied fine art, philosophy, and religious studies at various Canadian universities, receiving her Ph.D. in Religion and Culture from McGill University in 2008. Since that time she has taught in the department of Religious Studies at Memorial University of Newfoundland. Michelle also joined the faculty of Queen's College in 2015 as adjunct professor of theological studies. Her teaching interests have included the areas of philosophy of religion, theories of religion, comparative religion, the history of Christian thought, religious ethics, and environmental ethics. In her spare time, Michelle enjoys painting, and has also published two books of poetry (Wipf & Stock), with a third on the way.

Cecilia Saez is a graduate student in the Environmental Philosophy MA program at the University of Montana. She holds a BA in Philosophy from the University of Santiago de Compostela and an MA in Literary Studies from the Complutense University of Madrid. Her research focuses on the intersection between the philosophy of F. W. J. Schelling and the Early German Romantics—particularly that of Novalis and Friedrich Schlegel—and contemporary environmental issues. She is especially interested in concepts of wildness, rewilding, and the otherness of nature and animals, as well as in localism and degrowth theories.

Gavin Shields, HBA & MEd, works on the curriculum development and government relations team at Seven Generations Educational Institute. His participatory community-based research experience numbers over 7 SSHRC funded projects throughout Northwestern Ontario and abroad since 2017 when his HBA in Indigenous Learning & Philosophy lead to experiential field work in various roles as research assistant and associate. During his MEd for Change with a Specialization in Indigenous Education, a focus on holistic and contemplative education with advisor Dr. David Greenwood began on-going dialogue centered around the journey of *Cosmological Homecoming*. What do our psyches (souls) need to be well in modern times? How do we decolonize and reinhabit the place(s) we and our many ancestor's—human and more-than-human—call home? PARTICIPANTS

Barry Stephenson is Professor of Religion and Culture at Memorial University and a Co-director of FANE. His research explores ritual theory, religion and the arts, and religion in modern public life, with a particular interest in contemporary ritualization, performance, and the intersections of religion, the arts, and ritual.

Mateusz Stróżyński is a Professor of Classics and the Director of the Institute of Classical Philology at Adam Mickiewicz University, Poznań. He is the editor of *Antigone Journal*, and the author of *Plotinus on the Contemplation of the Intelligible World*, *The Human Tragicomedy: the Reception of Apuleius' Golden Ass in the Twentieth and Twenty-First Century*, and *Adam Mickiewicz, Metaphysical Poems*.

Giulia Valpione is Marie-Curie Fellow at the École Normale Supérieure (Paris) and Visiting Scholar at DePaul University (Chicago). She has published extensively on German Romanticism, the politics/nature relationship, and the history of women philosophers. Her first monograph, *The Romantic Self. Sovereignty and the Politics of Nature*, will be published by Cambridge University Press in early 2026.

Uwe Voigt holds the Chair in Analytical Philosophy and the Philosophy of Science at the University of Augsburg. He has published on Comenius, Aristotle, and panpsychism.

Nicole Whalen is an Assistant Professor of Philosophy at Memorial University. Her research includes political economy with a focus on environmental issues, especially the politics of the commons.

Christina White is an undergraduate student studying Sociology at Memorial University. Prior to entering academia, she lived in five different countries while working in the hospitality industry, an experience that sparked her curiosity about social rituals and community. She is especially interested in researching altered states of consciousness on which she will be presenting, as well as new religious movements and ecological stewardship.
